

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE SOCIETY

1976	Advert was placed in the Evening Telegraph by R. H. Woodcock to gauge the interest in old transport with the idea of forming a local club.
1979	The first Cavalcade of Transport was held in Hall Park, Rushden.
1980	The Society purchased Bristol 651 double decker bus from United Counties which became the Society's Flagship.
1984	Obtained lease on Rushden Station site from Northamptonshire County Council. The Society also gained charitable status.
1986	Small artefact museum was opened in old waiting room, and ladies waiting room was transformed into a Victorian themed Real Ale Bar.
1987	Station was threatened with demolition.
1996	Station site purchased from Northamptonshire County Council.
1998	Barclay 0-4-0, Edmundsons 2168 was purchased and Rolls Royce Sentinal 0-4-0 Diesel was kindly given by Castle Cement Co.Ltd. with 5 goods wagons.
1999	Excavation of 25,000cu yards of waste material from the cutting north of Rushden Station. Planning granted to lay 700 yds. of track to beyond the Shirley Road bridge. Track was obtained to build this extension.
2001	Negotiations with Councils to extend lease beyond the bridge started.
2003	The Society was given an Ex Rushden Bedford TK Fire Engine and the final payment on the Station site was made to N.C.C.
2004	Site rearranged in preparation for construction of new link road, John Clark Way.
2006	Improvements to track layout and museum site continued.
2009	Flagship vehicle 651 goes to Blackpool for £35,000 refit. (Returned unfinished) 50th anniversary of last timetabled passenger train to run on branch line. Rushden, Higham and Wellingborough Railway commence heritage train services Consultations with ENC and Greenway project over duel use of trackbed to Higham.
2010	Repairs to bridge over track and HMRI approval of track extension.
2011	Opening of extension of railway track towards Higham alongside Greenway.
2012	Cancelation of the 34th Cavalcade due to waterlogged fields.
2013	The Duke of Gloucester visited the Station and had a ride on the Railway
2014	Lease on trackbed to Queensway, Higham Ferrers acquired. Application for Museum Accreditation submitted by Museum Group. Negotiations with NCC to purchase ex- Railway Goods Shed. Edmundsons visits Pontypool & Blaenavon Railway.
2015	Bristol RE coach ORP 273F destroyed by fire at the Station
2016	Rushden Transport Museum awarded full accreditation by the Arts Council.

EVENTS SINCE THE LAST MAGAZINE:-

Model Weekend:=

Andy West and Dave Smith once again had arranged a good variety of exhibits. Railway layouts ranged from N gauge up to G scale with live steam in both O Gauge and Gauge 1. Museum Matters

Accreditation One Year On

It has been a year since we gained the Arts Council Accreditation Standard for the 'Rushden Transport Museum'; the collection of objects, vehicles and ephemera that give our four station rooms atmosphere and a feeling of nostalgia to all our visitors.

What has accreditation meant to our Trustees, Volunteers and Visitors?

For the Trustees accreditation status has highlighted their responsibilities to the care of the collection and the maintenance of standards both for volunteers working for the Society and standards that are expected by visitors to the Museum, Railway and website. Accreditation is a framework within which we must work and has guidelines for all aspects of museum tasks and so it means that we are all working towards an agreed set of policies and procedures, making life, in the long run, easier and more transparent for us all.

For the volunteers accreditation means a lot of work Museum Development East Midlands, that helped us to prepare for accreditation, became very keen to take us under their wing and offer us support in a variety of areas, but only after we completed a Business Diagnostic - a self-assessment that highlights where development is needed. This was not too gruelling and fulfilled its purpose; so much so that we were offered help with 'Audience Development', 'Working with Young People', 'Volunteer Development', 'Digital Engagement' and 'Collection Care'.

After a short while it became clear that with all the best will in the world, a handful of volunteers could not take on all these new developments as well as keep the museum running. We still had to maintain the basic requirements of an accredited museum for example, pest and environment monitoring. We decided that our greatest lack of knowledge lay with collection care especially conservation; and also we felt we needed advice developing and increasing our volunteers, so we took up these two as our main focus for the year.

We were encouraged to apply for funding to host conservation training and purchase a basic cleaning kit, yet another application form to complete! We have already reported on the two enjoyable sessions here at the station, with Anita Hollinshead when we shared her expertise with our colleagues at Rushden Museum. Armed with our new knowledge we feel confident to attempt conservational cleaning to preserve on our artefacts and are now developing conservation sessions in the Museum. If you fancy having ago just email the museum for the next dates in the diary, it's a fun social time.

The 'Volunteer Development Programme' involved trips to various locations and after putting in a 'volunteer's development plan' we were able to get funding to purchase fleeces (with a new volunteer's logo!), for winter conservation sessions in the museum. It also paid for the new swinging sign that not only acts as a museum open sign, but also encourages you as a member, to come and join us. Hopefully you will have spotted it on the platform. We were advised to revise the volunteer's handbook and continue to communicate with our team through the monthly Newsletter. Although lovely to have these new features every step of the way involves a lot of work from discussion to design, to production.

I Just when we thought there could be no more pressure we joined forces with colleagues from Rushden Museum again. This time in the joint project with Trading Places and Rockingham Forest Trust at Stanwick Lakes to put on the 'Rushden Trading Places 1901' event. We were involved in developing posters, leaflets and quizzes as well as liaising with High Street shops. One of the aims for the project was to introduce Rushden primary schools to the Station and Museum as a venue for educational visits; and through our new contacts we had two very intense days of hands-on activities based on the Victorian Station. We are really pleased to have forged a relationship with Rushden Museum and hope to do other projects together in the future.

Although 'Working with Young People' was not something we felt we could focus on this year, it so happens that we have had more school visits than ever! I think the message is spreading that our Station and Museum are an ideal location to inspire a local history topic linked to Rushden transport. Next year we are looking forward to obtaining funding to host a schools' focus group as part of our development plan.

Early this year, we were fortunate enough to obtain funding from the Co-Op to enable us to develop our visitor experience and from

this money we have gained a more permanent version of the drayman photo, a museum focused leaflet to inform schools and other groups of the Museum's potential, talking of which, the local Rotary Clubs have recognised this already and we have had several evening group visits.

These visits are enjoyable for us, as often these visitors remember using the Station and can tell us a thing or two. With the remaining money we are hoping for some better signage within the station rooms. Again all this activity takes time and effort that hopefully will benefit the Society as a whole; but more volunteers would help lighten our load.

I knew we had been busy but whilst writing this summary I have realised that we have had an incredibly hectic year. It has been interesting and exciting trying to think how we can show ourselves in the best way to our visitors. So what have they gained? We always greet visitors with a smile, but now the exhibits are starting to 'smile' too. The rooms are hoovered regularly and the spider webs kept at bay (well almost!). Visitors can sense that we are trying to give them the experience they want, as our survey sheets often say in answer to the question 'What would you change?' they respond with 'Nothing'. But we do listen to them as they walk around and respond quietly in small ways that gradually improve what we do. We also listen to each other so that we can all get the most reward from volunteering our time to the Museum. We may have had to be shut on some occasions, but it is not from want of trying. So if you feel you would like to join our Museum team, come and chat to us, there is certainly plenty of varied things to do and professionally led training to be had, so that our Museum can continue as a credit to us all in the Society.

PS if you have not visited the museum yet this year the season closes on 29th October!

Blue Circle the Next Installment

Since the arrival of Blue Circle in January 2015 much work has been carried out to bring this historic steam locomotive back to full working order.

The original plan was to start stripping down Blue Circle immediately on arrival, however operational problems to move the loco out of the reception road to a more suitable location within the station confines was not immediately possible so i looked around the site for a small project until the loco could be moved.

Hidden under a canvas tent in the station compound was the partly restored Scammell 3 ton iron horse which was crying out for someone to take it forward. Part of my professional work is the preparation and coach painting of heritage vehicles mainly in the heritage railway sector so I approached board members for approval to start restoration. A budget and work program was submitted and approval given.

Work started in late January and this took up all my time until the tractor and trailer was cosmetically completed ready for the Cavalcade in May.

Work could now be started on the 10 year overhaul of Blue Circle and once all the boiler fittings were removed it was then necessary to remove the front wheels and front frames so programmed work to remove 20 front tube plate rivets and build up the bottom half of the tube plate flange could be undertaken. With the welding completed it was now possible to hot rivet the tube plate on a day that would not upset the locals.

Once this work was completed the boiler inspector was then called in to inspect the repairs to his satisfaction, it was most pleasing to use local skilled tradesmen with the welder located in Rushden and the boiler smith from Irchester.

Next it was time to order the boiler tubes from the main stockist in the UK only to be told that there was a delay due to Christmas and New Year holidays and to my horror that the tubes had to be ordered from Germany as nobody in the UK produces boiler tubes to the specification that was required.

Six weeks later I was collecting the delayed order from Suffolk and booking in the boiler smith for their fitting and other minor works. Due to the uncommon size of the boiler tubes it was necessary to purchase a new set of tube expanders to swell out the tube ends in the fire box and smoke box so they fitted tightly and did not leak under pressure.

Where do you get tube expanders these days? Answer - One of the last places where these are manufactured lies less than 1 mile from the Station, well at least

we still have a manufacturing industry if you know where to look.

The boiler inspector was again called in to carry out the hydraulic test when the boiler is filled up with water and hand pumped to one third over its permissible maximum working pressure and held continuously for 20 minutes to check for leaks. This test was successful and the appropriate paper work was obtained which allowed me to reassemble the loco and start steam tests.

The wheels and frames were reassembled with the help of working members and a new oak front buffer beam was attached. All boiler fittings and other working mechanisms were fixed and the loco looked complete at last.

The fire was lit for the first time during May this year and pressure allowed to slowly increase, however the gauge frames that allow you to see the water

level in the boiler were leaking from several locations and the decision was taken to renew all the bronze retaining and take up nuts, this was undertaken by an engineer in Rushden.

The refurbished gauge frames were soon returned and fitted and to date i am setting up the correct alignment so the gauge glasses can be fitted without leaking or breaking.

This ten year restoration has been quite challenging compared to the previous 2 but with a little more persistence I can soon see the end result with a satisfactory steam test and another ten years of successful steaming.

FLAGSHIP 651

A long awaited report.

We are still trying to locate parts, and it is becoming more evident that many will have to be fabricated, meaning more work for Tony Pearson who has already fabricated the mounting bracket for the gearshift box for us. This had to be mounted onto the cab side of the engine. it then took five months to find a suitable flywheel, and clutch assembly which had to be done by Truckfix.

During the early Summer, Dave Thompson and myself got the gearbox in, and the drive train from the engine to the wheels is now installed. The gear linkage and clutch will have to be set up properly when running.



Tony said he would see if it was possible to fabricate the exhaust downpipe from the manifold utilising pipes we have from various sources. Once this was done and fitted, 651 could come down off the axle stands, and the braking system could then be started. Bus wheels are a bit on the heavy side to take off when 2 feet in the air.

At this time, I have one of the back doors in my shed as when refurbished at Blackpool it is the wrong length, fortunately on the large side and is fouling the floor and the frame at the top, so it only needs a couple of mills off each end.
